

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Invisible Boundaries records and catalogues the objects and artefacts of Day's home, as well as the ephemeral imprints of time and people passing through it.




Day's work has been dubbed 'anti-photography' or 'total photography', constantly revisiting the same places over and over again.





















Day has taken more than 1,000 images over three years, exploring the limits of what the photograph, as an image, can tell us about ourselves.
